Brown would agree with Assemblyman Dickinson as he signed this bill into law. It will take effect beginning January 1, 2015.

CA AB 1014 Skinner (D) Gun Violence Restraining Orders **POSITION: OPPOSE SUMMARY:** Provides for the issuance of a gun violence restraining order requested by an ex parte, (family or others), if they suspect there is a danger. Requires notification of the local District Attorney; provides for a misdemeanor for the false application of such order; provides that a person who violates the order is guilty of a misdemeanor and restricted from the possession of a firearm or ammunition for a specified time period. Senate APPROPRIATIONS Suspense File.

CA AB 1609 Aleio (D) Firearms **POSITION: OPPOSE**

SUMMARY: Prohibits a resident of the state from importing into the state, bringing into the state, or transporting into the state, any firearm that they purchased or otherwise obtained on or after a specified date from outside of the state, unless they first have that firearm delivered to a dealer in the state for delivery to that resident. Senate APPROPRIATIONS.

CA SB 53 De Leon (D) Ammunition: Purchase Permits POSITION: OPPOSE

SUMMARY: Requires the Attorney General

to maintain copies of ammunition purchase permits, ammunition transactions and ammunition vendor licenses. Requires an ammunition purchaser to be authorized by the Department of Justice. Provides the date when only a licensed ammunition vendor may sell ammunition. Requires verification of identity. Relates to ammunition sales location requirements. Assembly FLOOR.

CA SB 199 De Leon (D) BB Devices **POSITION: OPPOSE**

SUMMARY: Deletes a specified restriction from the definition of BB device. Includes BB devices within the definition of imitation firearms for purposes of existing law that prohibits anyone from purchasing, selling, manufacturing, shipping, transporting, distributing, or receiving an imitation firearm and makes a person liable for a civil fine for a violation. Assembly APPROPRIATIONS.

CA SB 808 De Leon (D) Firearms: Identifying Information POSITION: OPPOSE

SUMMARY: Requires that a person who manufactures or assembles a firearm to first apply to the Department of Justice for a unique serial number or other identifying mark. Requires any person who owns a firearm that does not bear a serial number to likewise apply to the Department for a unique serial number or other mark of identification. Makes a violation of these provisions a misdemeanor. Assembly APPROPRIATIONS.

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Lose One, Win Two in the Courts!

California

Let's start with the bad news, on July 17. 2014, the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals unanimously denied appellants' (that's our side's) petition for rehearing of the three judge panel's decision on the Jackson v. San Francisco case. The petition for rehearing en banc was circulated to the judges of the court, and no judge requested a vote for en banc consideration. En Banc means that a decision made by a three judge panel is reheard by a panel of 11 judges from the court instead of the just three.

This is the case where the City and County of San Francisco passed an ordinance requiring residents to lock up their guns while at home unless the guns were on their person, basically both day and night. Also, this measure banned the use of common self-defense ammunition such as hollowpoint or soft-nosed bullets within the city limits. The three judge panel, that included a judge appointed by President Carter and two judges appointed by President Bush, upheld the validity of the ordinance passed by San Francisco's Board of Supervisors.

Although, no one can say for sure as to why the court went in this direction, there is strong speculation that all of the appellate courts throughout the country are waiting for the U.S. Supreme Court (SCOTUS) to offer definitive guidance as to what level of scrutiny they are required to use regarding Second Amendment cases. GOC believes that SCOTUS has already given such guidance but is being ignored by many of the lesser courts.

Unless a ruling in another case in the near future, resolves these issues, Jackson v. San Francisco will be appealed to SCOTUS.

Now for some good news.

Washington DC

On July 24th, 2014, Senior District Court Judge Frederick J. Scullin, Jr. ordered that open carry of handguns is legal in the District of Columbia for residents who have legally registered handguns and non-residents who are not felons! Justice Scullin ruled that the government and law enforcement are prohibited from enforcing the codes that ban open carry of handguns.

It is expected that the ruling will be appealed to the DC Circuit Court of Appeals as soon as possible.

Justice Scullin argued that given the rulings in the Peruta v. San Diego (constitutional right to self defense), and in Heller v. Washington DC and McDonald v. Chicago (Second Amendment is an individual right and allows you to keep a gun at home), it leaves no other possibility than to accept the fact that bearing arms refers to carrying arms outside the home. Since the government of Washington DC does not allow for legal concealed carry, the only other option is legal open carry.

Although, Judge Scullin initially ordered that his ruling go into immediate effect, a few days later he stayed his ruling giving the DC Government 90 days to come up with a plan that would pass constitutional muster.

Still, this is a stunning victory!

Florida

In another case that is causing the Constitution hating anti-gunners to go prematurely gray, the 11th Circuit Court of Appeals ruled in favor of a law passed by the State of Florida and signed by

Governor Rick Scott that made it illegal for doctors to ask patients if they owned guns when it was unnecessary to a patient's care.

The challenge was brought by the American Academies of Pediatrics and American College of Physicians chapter in the Orange State. They claimed that the new Florida law was an infringement of their (the medical community's) First Amendment rights of free speech and thus to ask anything they wanted of their patients.

The court held that "the Act simply codifies that good medical care does not require inquiry or record-keeping regarding firearms when unnecessary to a patient's care."

Although this ruling only applies in the states covered by the 11th Circuit, look for it to spread like wildfire to the other circuits near

Observations

It is becoming very clear that some significant opportunities for victories in restoring the Second Amendment will be coming from the Halls of Justice. Rest assured that Gun Owners of California will be fighting on all three fronts; the Legislature, the Elections and the Courts.

We are over three quarters of the way through the 2013/2014 Legislative Session and we are more than ready to be finished with the plethora of unconstitutional bills that have danced their way through the legislative process. Some of the bills that are up for hearing over the next few months are hold-overs from last year, while others are brand new to the liberal agenda. Gun Owners of California has been following each and every bill that affects the Second Amendment and your right to keep and bear arms, every step of the way. In the midst of the political chaos that surrounds an election year, along with the thousands of bills they still have to hear, the Legislature has taken their annual summer break and have already resumed legislating. As of August 4th, your faithful representatives have been working overtime in order to move their precious bills along before the August 30th deadline. Stay tuned for more legislative updates over the coming weeks, as well as the latest drama from the election front.

CA AB 1964 Dickinson (D) Firearms: Single Shot Exemption POSITION: OPPOSE **SUMMARY:** Limits the definition of single shot handgun to break top or bolt action handguns only. The conversion of a semiauto pistol to a single shot pistol by a federally licensed firearms manufacturer although completely legal under both federal and present state law will become illegal. This bill does not target criminals, criminal activity, nor does it prevent firearms related accidents. GOC believes AB 1964 is a further attempt to prevent law-abiding Californian's from obtaining the newest, safest, and most efficient firearms available to all other citizens of the United States. *Unfortunately*, it was predictable that Governor Jerry
